

These two photos show that the railyard at Chalon, France, was reduced to a mass of twisted steel by an attack of Allied air forces. At the time of the attack, the yard was jammed with supplies for troops facing the Allied armies advancing from southern invasion beaches and troops evacuating to Germany.
